### Police detain man with bloody arm after Main Street window smashed

BLOOMSBURG — A smashed store window and a block-long blood trail led police to detain a man with an injured arm Sunday night, but not to a clear crime or motive.

Officers grabbed the man on Main Street, minutes after a neighbor reported the damage to Krickett Square women's clothing shop.

Because the suspect was badly hurt and bleeding heavily, medics took him to Geisinger Medical Center for treatment before any charges could be filed, they said.

Nothing appeared missing from the merchandise on display, which includes Vera Bradley handbags and costume jewelry, owner Darlene Weidner said.

Tom Hand, who lives in an apartment above Phillips Emporium, said he heard a smashing sound a little after 8 p.m. and looked out his window. He saw a group of five or six people, some women and some men, walking down Main Street toward Town Hall.

"They didn't seem to be in any hurry," Hand said.

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## Pickup rolls on woman

Danville victim, 20, is 'critical,' authorities say

VALLEY TWP. — A Danville woman was pinned beneath a pickup after being thrown from the rolling truck early Sunday, authorities said.

Firefighters had to free Ashley VanHorn, who was trapped from her hips down under the wreckage and barely conscious, according to police and a fire official.

The 20-year-old was listed in critical condition at Geisinger Medical Center on Sunday night, a nursing supervisor said.

VanHorn was riding in a Chevrolet Silverado driven by Zachery Bachman, 22, of Danville, police said. The truck was heading east on McCracken Road at 2:42 a.m.

Rounding an S-curve, Bachman's truck veered off the right side of the road and careened down a 20-foot embankment, troopers said. The pickup then flipped twice.

Slim Clinton Pa. lead may not reverse skid

WASHINGTON — Hillary Clinton leads among bowlers, gun owners and hunters in Pennsylvania, a blue-collar trifecta that is helping her hold an edge over rival Barack Obama heading into Tuesday's pivotal primary there.

The New York senator leads by solid margins in all three slices of working-class Pennsylvania — the political battleground where the two Democrats have waged war for control of the state, according to a new poll conducted for McClatchy Newspapers, MSNBC and the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette.

### Police borrow driving licenses to win party hosts' cooperation

BLOOMSBURG — Police took custody of a driver's license at each house while shutting down parties late Saturday in a new tactic to get hosts' cooperation, the chief said.

"When we come back, if there's anyone on your porch, you're going to be arrested," Ptlm. Matthew Golla told one man after taking his license.

Nate Glose, president of Alpha Chi Rho fraternity at 355 Lightstreet Road, said an officer took his license and gave the same warning.

Glose, 20, from Whitehall, was surprised by the tactic.

"I've never seen that in my life," he said.

Police Chief Leo Sokoloski said it was a new step this year, meant to get the hosts' help in clearing boisterous, outdoor parties.

## Youth laments ban on seeing grandmother

19-year-old pleads guilty to stealing \$5 from Berwick-area woman who says she fears him

BLOOMSBURG — A teen who stole \$5 from his grandmother can't go near the woman for another year-and-a-half, and that's the worst part of his punishment, he says.

Timothy Clouser, 19, says he now plans to leave this area once he's done with a probation program for first-time offenders.

"This area seems to suck the life out of you," he said after pleading guilty in
